6.16. GRANT FUNDING PROPOSAL - REGIONAL ARTS FUND (RAF) FOR ERGON ENERGY PLACEMAKING PROJECT

RECOMMENDATION

That Council resolves to support an application to the Regional Arts Fund (RAF) for up to \$30,000 to develop and implement the Creative Spark Ergon Energy Public Art Project, inclusive of a Council-led framework for public art installations on Ergon Energy assets.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Creative Spark Ergon Energy Public Art Project presents an opportunity for Douglas Shire Council to establish a strategic and sustainable framework for public art installations on Ergon Energy assets. This initiative will ensure a structured, best-practice approach to approvals, cultural consultation, insurance, risk management, maintenance, and material compliance.

Currently, no formal process exists to support these installations, creating barriers for artists, the community, and Council in delivering high-quality, inclusive public art outcomes. By applying for funding under the Regional Arts Fund (RAF), Council can facilitate the development of this framework and pilot the installation of up to ten decorated Ergon Energy assets across the Shire.

The pilot project will serve as a test case for the framework, refining the processes and demonstrating the potential for broader implementation. This initiative aligns with Council's Operational Plan objectives to support placemaking and creative community expression through public art.

BACKGROUND

Douglas Shire has a strong tradition of embracing public art as a means of cultural storytelling, placemaking, and enhancing community identity. However, the absence of a formalised process for installing public art on Ergon Energy assets has limited opportunities for creative placemaking.

The Creative Spark initiative (funding proposal) is a two-stage project that will:

- 1. Develop a structured Council-led framework to guide public art installations on Ergon Energy infrastructure, ensuring consistency in application approvals, cultural protocols, insurance, materials, and assessment processes.
- 2. Pilot the program by delivering up to ten decorated assets at key locations within the Douglas Shire to test and refine the framework.

This project aligns with the Draft Corporate Plan 2025 – 2030, Council's locally identified priorities for Arts and Culture, and will inform the review and development of Council's Arts General Policy and Public Art Policy in 2025.

COMMENTS

The Regional Arts Fund Project Grants offer up to \$30,000 for high-quality arts initiatives benefiting regional communities. While co-contributions are not mandatory, applications must demonstrate a level of support from the applicant.

Council's in-kind contribution to the funding proposal will include the time and resources within the Arts and Culture role to facilitate policy development, community engagement, site preparation, mapping, curation, venue provision, and media. RAF funding will support key project components such as cultural consultation, project management, documentation, digital communications, professional artist fees, and materials.

PROPOSAL

That Council supports an application to the Regional Arts Fund (RAF) for up to \$30,000 to facilitate the development and delivery of the Creative Spark project, with Council providing in-kind contributions to ensure project viability and success.

FINANCIAL/RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

The funding application will seek up to \$30,000 from the Regional Arts Fund, with Council providing in-kind contributions in the form of administrative and logistical support. No direct financial allocation from Council is required for the project at this stage.

RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

A structured framework for public art installations will reduce risks associated with public art projects, including:

- Establishing clear protocols for approvals and maintenance to mitigate legal and compliance risks.
- Ensuring cultural consultation is embedded to avoid inappropriate representations or insensitive placements.
- Managing insurance and material compliance considerations to ensure longevity and safety of installations.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

Economic: Public art installations contribute to the vibrancy of public spaces,

supporting cultural tourism and local artist engagement.

Environmental: The framework will include guidelines on sustainable materials and

practices to minimise environmental impact.

Social: The project will enhance community pride and connection to place

while fostering cultural expression and inclusion.
