RECOMMENDATION

That Council endorse the Local Delivery of Financially Settled Offsets motion for submission to the Local Association of Queensland annual conference for consideration.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ) is calling on local governments to submit motions for consideration at the annual conference to be held in October 2025.

BACKGROUND

From Monday, 2 June 2025 until Monday, 28 July 2025, councils are invited to submit motions for consideration ahead of this year's Annual Conference on the Gold Coast, which will take place from Monday, October 20, 2025, to Wednesday, October 22, 2025.

If passed, these motions become resolutions recognised by other levels of government – and, indeed, other peak bodies and stakeholders – as the accepted policy position of the sector and the LGAQ. They are binding on the LGAQ team to progress.

Many of the commitments made for the sector by the new State Government in 2024/25, for example, were based on policy positions local governments raised and voted for at various Annual Conferences in recent years, which were then turned into key asks in the LGAQ State Election platform.

Background (required) 350 word limit	At times, local governments and other stakeholders are required to deliver activities that result in significant residual impact on a prescribed environmental matter, and as such, are required to deliver an environmental offset in accordance with the Environmental Offsets Act 2014 (the Act).



Under the Act, individuals can elect to deliver an environmental offset as either:

- 1. a proponent-driven offset; or
- 2. a financial settlement offset; or
- 3. a combination of a proponent-driven offset and a financial settlement offset.

The Queensland Environmental Offsets Policy (2025) (the Policy) provides further guidance on how environmental offsets should be delivered in accordance with the Act.

Under section 2.2 of the Policy, <u>local</u> delivery of landbased proponent-driven offsets is given priority, with the following order of preference:

- the same local government area (LGA); or
- the same sub-region; or
- the same bioregion; or
- adjacent bioregion.

Case study/ Example (optional) 350 word limit

No similar local delivery preference is provided for a financially settled environmental offset.

Instead, the State Government has the authority to approve the delivery of a financially settled environment offset OUTSIDE of the local area, potentially resulting in the loss of an environmental value from that area.

This policy setting can create challenges for local governments and other stakeholders who, at times, are unable to deliver a proponent-driven environmental offset due to the immediacy of the work required to be undertaken, the approval processes required under the Act and the associated local environmental conditions.

In these instances, individuals are left with no choice other than a financially settled environmental offset, otherwise potentially risking significant delays in project delivery.
