6.6. RADF COUNCIL INITIATED PUBLIC ART: MOSAICS FOR MOSSMAN

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Endorses the Mossman Planter Boxes Mosaic Project, as a Council initiated public art project through the Regional Arts Development Fund,
- 2. Endorses the re-allocation of funding of \$15,000 from Council's current Operational budget and \$15,000 from the Regional Arts Development Fund, and
- 3. Delegates authority to the Chief Executive Officer in accordance with s 257 of the *Local Government Act 2009* to finalise all matters associated with this project.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Council's Open Spaces team delivered planter box infrastructure to William Street, Mossman and proposed a continuation of the Front Street mosaic works be applied to the planter box surfaces.

Council's Officers requested artist Sam Matthews develop a project concept and costing to continue the Front Street mosaic works onto the William Street planter boxes, as a community driven public art project encompassing workshops, delivered across eight months to a wide cross section of the community.

This report provides a recommendation that Council endorse the proposal for the Mossman Planter Boxes Mosaic Project to be delivered as a Council initiated project under the Regional Arts Development Fund program for 2023-2024, with a 50:50 contribution to project costs allocated to Open Spaces and the RADF 2023-2024 Program.

BACKGROUND

The Front Street beautification project enlivened Mossman's Front Street with the delivery of tropical insect themed mosaic installations on planter boxes throughout the town centre. Artist Sam Matthews was engaged to facilitate the project through a series of community workshops, mosaic classes, and ceramics classes at Douglas Arts Base, working with 42 volunteers from across the community to create the final works.

This proposal is a not only a continuation and extension of the Front Street beautification works, but an extension to the several mosaic projects throughout the region that have engaged and connected the local creative community and resulted in vibrant works that reflect the stunning natural assets of the region.

COMMENTS

The costs associated with delivering the mosaic project are proposed to be allocated from Council's Open Spaces budget under beautification works and the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) as a Council initiated public art project as tabled:

Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF)

The Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) is a Queensland Government and Local Government partnership to support local arts and culture in regional Queensland.

Applications to Council's funding programs or submissions for Council initiated public art projects that support strategic initiatives, such as the creation of public art, are strengthened if proposals clearly articulate how locally identified priorities are addressed.

Community feedback obtained during the development of Council's Corporate Plan 2014-2019, the regular review of Council's Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF), consultation during the development of the Arts Strategy 2017-2021 and the incoming Strategy for Arts, Culture & Creativity 2024-2029 identify a great desire for Cultural Tourism, Placemaking and Public Art, while acknowledging the need for greater diversity and inclusivity.

Public art proposals are considered and assessed against Council's strategic directions, policies, planning controls, and corporate documents as well as against the RADF guidelines.

The 'Making Mosaics for Mossman' project will be a community led and delivered placemaking and public art project:

All three of the artists proposed to be involved as leads in the mosaic project: Sam Matthews, Leanne Emmett and Ellen Terrell, have demonstrated their experience and involvement in other local projects and will work collaboratively at each stage, sharing their knowledge, involving and skilling up local creative volunteers and emerging artists.

PROPOSAL

That Council note the proposal submitted by Sam Matthews for the Mossman Planter Boxes Mosaic Project and total project cost of \$30,000, and endorse the project be co-funded by Council's Open Spaces and RADF as a Council initiated public art project.

Funding of \$15,000 is proposed from an existing funding allocation from Open Spaces, matched by \$15,000 of funding from RADF.

FINANCIAL/RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

The costs associated with running the RADF Program have been provided for in the budget for the 12 months to 30 June 2024.

Ongoing maintenance, and repair costs associated with the mosaic installation are covered in the Open Spaces budget.

RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

The risk of issues arising during the delivery of the mosaic project is mitigated by the experience of lead artists, Sam Matthews and Leanne Emmett (with some involvement by Ellen Terrell) who have delivered several similar public art mosaics works throughout the region using the same design, production processes and community workshop model successfully, including:

- 1. 2017 Life Amongst the Trees, Rex Smeal Park, Port Douglas
- 2. 2018 RSL Remembrance Mosaic, RSL Building, Mossman
- 3. 2020 Life Amongst the Trees Part II, Rex Smeal Park, Port Douglas
- 4. 2021 Making Mosaics for Mossman, Front Street, Mossman

Financial risks will be mitigated by staged payments scheduled to project milestones. Lead Artist Sam Matthews has provided costings based on previous delivery time and costs, with consideration given to increases in material costs and freight, and these have informed her quote to deliver this project to budget.
