

6.4. CYCLONE JASPER EXPENDITURE TO MAY 2024

RECOMMENDATION

That Council

- 1. In accordance with s235(c) *Local Government Regulation 2012*, retrospectively approve \$21,634,309.53 expenditure incurred to date, in relation to the Cyclone Jasper Disaster Event.**
- 2. Council to note the funding advance received to date from Queensland Reconstruction Authority.**

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Cyclone Jasper impacted the Douglas Shire Council region on 13 December 2023, followed by a significant rain event (the “Cyclone Jasper Disaster Event”). The disaster event has resulted in a large amount of damage to the Douglas Shire assets and resultant expenditure for repairs, which is outside the current adopted budget for the year ended 30 June 2024.

This report seeks to obtain retrospective approval of expenditure incurred by Council to 31 May 2024.

BACKGROUND

The final economic impact of the Cyclone Jasper Disaster Event on the Operating Result for 30 June 2024 is yet to be determined.

The spending incurred to date is being presented to Council for retrospective approval in accordance with Council’s Procurement Policy and s235c of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*, as the emergency spend is outside the approved budget for year ended 30 June 2024.

Council officers are working on funding applications under Queensland’s Disaster Relief Funding Arrangements (DRFA) administered by the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA).

QRA has provided Douglas Shire Council with a funding advance to ensure cashflow is maintained throughout the disaster recovery process.

The following is a summary of the expenditure incurred to date, due to the disaster event:

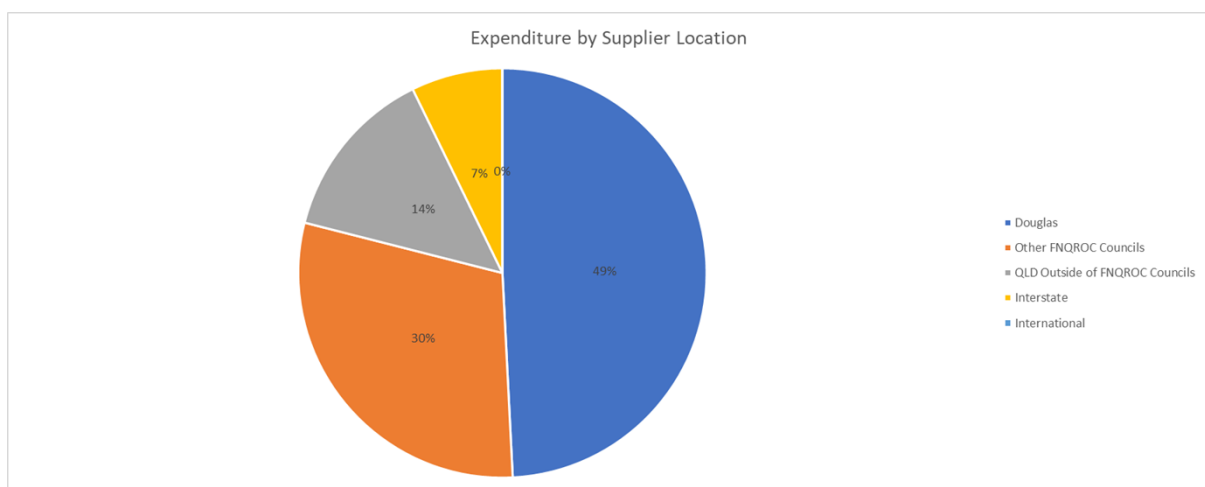

Council has expended approximately \$12,515,500 on emergent road repairs and approximately \$3,419,515 on water repairs to 31 May 2024.

The funding advance received to date from the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) is \$25,800,000.

PROPOSAL

That Council

1. In accordance with s235(c) *Local Government Regulation 2012*, retrospectively approve \$21,634,309.53 expenditure incurred to date, in relation to the Cyclone Jasper Disaster Event.
2. Council to note the funding advance received to date from Queensland Reconstruction Authority.

FINANCIAL/RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

As discussed above, the Cyclone Jasper disaster event occurred and has resulted in a large amount of damage to Douglas Shire assets and resultant expenditure for counter-disaster operations and emergency repairs and remediation, which is outside the current adopted budget for the year ended 30 June 2024.

The final economic impact on the Operating Result for 30 June 2024 is yet to be determined. This analysis will include proposed financial relief measures, the impact on revenue and expenditure, costs of repair and recovery and the outcome of any funding applications.

Council officers are working on funding applications under the Disaster Relief Funding Arrangements (DRFA). The DRFA funds are administered by Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA). QRA has provided Douglas Shire Council with several funding advances, totalling \$25.8m to ensure cashflow is maintained throughout the disaster recovery process.

In accordance with s204 of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*, monthly financial reports which record the progress against the budget will be presented to Council. These reports will include expenditure incurred as a result of the Cyclone Jasper Disaster Event and any funding received by Council.

RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

There is significant risk if funding is not approved it will either slow down or halt the recovery process after ex-TC Jasper.
