REGIONAL ARTS DEVELOPMENT FUND (RADF) APPLICATION FOR FUNDING 2015-2016

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council:

- 1 endorses the 2015-2016 Regional Arts Development Fund application for funding to Arts Queensland based on a Council contribution of \$12,600;
- adopts the new Douglas Shire Council Regional Arts Development Fund Guidelines and application form; and
- delegates authority to the Mayor and Chief Executive Officer in accordance with the Local Government Act 2009 to finalise any minor amendments in relation to the Regional Arts Development Fund funding application 2015-2016.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) is a longstanding and highly successful state and local government partnership promoting the role and value of arts, culture and heritage as key drivers of sustainable, diverse and prosperous local Queensland communities.

In the 2014-2015 financial year Council had \$20,000 in the budget for RADF. Council approved seven RADF projects requiring \$17,620 in RADF funding. The remaining \$2,380 is allocated to arts and cultural policy development.

Investment is available to 59 eligible Queensland Councils for the RADF Program. Councils must have also satisfied the reporting and financial requirements of any previous Arts Queensland funding to be eligible to apply for RADF investment. Arts Queensland has invited Council to submit an online application for RADF 2015-16 funding by 3pm Friday 8 May 2015. This report seeks Council's endorsement of the proposed funding application to Arts Queensland.

BACKGROUND:

Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) invests in local arts and cultural priorities as determined by local communities and has four key objectives: supporting local artists and arts and cultural activity to deliver value for local communities; providing opportunities for local communities to participate in arts and culture, investing in locally-determined priorities delivered through arts and cultural activity; and contributing towards current Government targets and priorities.

For over 20 years RADF was delivered in partnership with local Councils and has contributed towards approximately 3,000 arts and cultural projects across the State each year. During 2014 Arts Queensland engaged in state wide consultation with councils with a view to reduce program administration and increase the potential for RADF to grow results that matter to local communities.

As a result of the consultations a number of changes have been implemented:

- from 2015–16 councils have more flexibility to create and deliver locally-relevant RADF programs to ensure RADF creates valuable outcomes for local communities and continues to deliver quality arts experiences and supports a strong and sustainable arts and cultural sector
- Application for RADF funding is made online.

Arts Queensland advises Councils to develop individual Council Guidelines and application forms based on the introductory sections of the *Guidelines for Councils applying to Arts Queensland for Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) 2015-16 Funding* and on local discussions and deliberations in relation to local priorities, assessment depending on local RADF operations, and preferred governance arrangements.

COMMENT:

Council's funding application has been compiled based on the *Guidelines for Council applying to Arts Queensland Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) 2015-16 Funding*, as well as feedback from the development of the Corporate Plan, The Arts in Douglas - Have your say! survey in March 2015 and Councillors. This information was used to determine local needs and priorities for the arts in the Douglas Shire and help implement a locally tailored RADF program based on locally relevant decision making processes, delivery models and priorities.

Based on the Douglas Shire's population, Council is RADF Tier 2, meaning the dollar ratio for financial contributions to the RADF program is 70% Arts Queensland and 30% Council, with the maximum Arts Queensland allocation capped at \$30,000.

In the 2014/2015 year the Shire's \$20,000 RADF program, comprising \$14,000 from Arts Queensland and \$6,000 from Council, funded seven projects. One strategic initiative (Arts and Cultural Policy development), has also been funded, which will be completed in the 2015/2016 financial year. Whilst only two applications were not successful under the 2014/2015 program, conversations and surveys highlighted a few points: some people did not apply to RADF because the capped amount of \$3,000 per application did not meet their needs; some felt RADF required such a lot of paperwork for a small amount of money, people didn't have the confidence to apply because the application form was too daunting; people believed they weren't "professional or emerging" artists.

With these points in mind, revised RADF Guidelines and applications have been drafted. The traditional RADF "categories" and eligibility checklist have been removed, the capped amount has been increased to \$5,000 (capping grant amounts was a local decision made by the RADF Committee at the outset, with a view to sharing the small pool of funding for a number of community projects) and created the application form to align more closely with the Arts Queensland's other funding programs. Another aspect about the new RADF is Councils can always change the guidelines and forms in the future to tailor changing community and Council priorities.

RADF funding for a number Council's Strategic Initiatives will potentially give talented local artists (some lacking the self-confidence and grant writing skills to apply for RADF) opportunities to showcase their works through Council "driven" community projects.

Consequently Council's application for funding will request Arts Queensland contribute \$29,400, with Council contributing \$12,600 to make a \$42,000 program to fund a 'traditional' grants program, strategic initiatives, policy development and training.

PROPOSAL:

The proposal is for Council to:

- endorse the 2015-2016 Regional Arts Development Fund application for funding to Arts Queensland based on a Council contribution of \$12,600
- adopt the new Douglas Shire Council Regional Arts Development Fund Guidelines and application form; and
- delegate authority to the Mayor and Chief Executive Officer in accordance with the Local Government Act 2009 to finalise any minor amendments in relation to the Regional Arts Development Fund funding application 2015-2016.

Information Provider role involved conducting a public information session to advise potential applicants on the RADF program, the processes and how to complete applications and outcome reports.

Advocate role involved Council seeking feedback from community and RADF Committee regarding future funding requirements in relation to the RADF program and requesting an amount from Arts Queensland for the Annual funding application.

Agent role involved Council partnering with Arts Queensland in delivering the RADF Program.

Part Funder role involved Council contributing resources along with the State Government funding to deliver the RADF Program.

FINANCIAL/RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

The costs associated with running the RADF Program are to be provided for in the budget for the 12 months to 30 June 2016.

The RADF Liaison Officer will be responsible for administering the RADF Program and reporting to Council on funding recommendations as well as listing unsuccessful applications. The RADF Committee will be responsible for assessing applications after the RADF funding round closes. A Council officer will be responsible for transferring funds to successful applicants on return of signed funding agreements.

Council staff will coordinate Council's strategic initiatives and liaise with external stakeholders to deliver projects.

RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS:

The risks in relation to allocating public money through the RADF program are:

1 Failure to acquit funds

Risk Management procedures in relation to outstanding RADF Outcome Reports will consist of the following:

- Requests for extension of project timelines and/or Outcome Report deadlines are to be submitted in writing to appropriate Council officer.
- Council grants extensions of project timelines and/or Outcome Report deadlines on a case by case basis when such requests are deemed to be justified.
- Council officer contacts grantees who have obtained extensions on projects on a regular basis to monitor progress.

At times grantees may face circumstances beyond their control which impact on project timelines so Council officers will try to support artists and organisations in such situations to achieve the original outcomes of awarded projects.

2 Conflict

There may be a risk of conflict arising between applicants, the RADF Committee, Council staff, or elected members. Applicants will be encouraged to contact the Council officer about any disagreement or conflict with the grant application. Applicants will have the right to request a meeting with Council staff or RADF Committee to obtain feedback about their application or to view the minutes of assessment meetings.

To mitigate this risk minutes will clearly document RADF comments as to why an application should or should not be funded, with suggestions on where application could be improved for future submissions. In addition, feedback forms have been developed to gauge feedback from the people attending community workshops and from people who submitted applications so that Council can refine processes, presentation tools and other practices to improve the program.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS:

ECONOMIC: As part of the renewal process for RADF, the program supports the delivery of outcomes that meet the priority areas of the *Arts for all Queenslanders strategy 2014-18*, being: artistic, cultural, social and economic returns on investment; strengthening commercial and entrepreneurial capacity and cultural tourism; and growing the public value of arts and culture.

SOCIAL: As part of the renewal process for RADF, the program objectives are to: support locally determined arts and cultural priorities; support local artists and arts and cultural activity; and provide opportunities for local communities to participate in arts and cultural activities.

Council will also be required to evidence the following key performance indicators: Local communities engaged in RADF supported activities, measured by the number of participants and attendees at RADF supported activities; and RADF contributes to the liveability, community cohesion and local pride, measured by feedback from audiences, participants and partners.

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REGIONAL ARTS DEVELOPMENT FUND (RADF) Guidelines Amended April 2015

What is the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF)?

The Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) Invests in local arts and cultural priorities, as determined by local communities, across Queensland. RADF promotes the role and value of arts, culture and heritage as key drivers to develop sustainable, diverse and prosperous local communities.

What are the objectives of RADF?

- support local artists and arts and cultural activity to deliver value for local communities.
- provide opportunities for local communities to participate in arts and cultural activities
- Invest in locally-determined priorities delivered through arts and cultural activity
- contribute towards current Government targets and priorities

What are the principles of RADF?

- Local empower local councils to determine priorities and outcomes through arts and cultural activity to meet the aspirations and needs of their local community
- Participation –ensure local communities in all areas of Queensland have access to arts and cultural initiatives, programs and opportunities that are locally relevant
- Quality focus on investing in arts and cultural outcomes which will have the highest value to local communities across Queensland
- Diversity respond to the diversity of communities, councils, arts and cultural activity and practices across Queensland and support flexible delivery models

RADF recognises local governments as key partners and co-investors in local arts and culture, and therefore is delivered as a partnership between the Queensland Government, through Arts Queensland, and eligible local councils across the state.

What can RADF be used for?

RADF funding is flexible and responsive and supports locally-determined decision making processes, delivery models and priorities to ensure councils and communities can invest in arts and culture-led outcomes that deliver value to them.

RADF 2015 - as presented by Queensiand Government - does not exclude any arts and cultural activity/practitioner. RADF supports arts and culture led delivery of locally defined priorities. Councils determine what RADF may support or not support based upon contribution to local needs and consultation with their communities.

RADF funding could support:

- development and delivery of diverse, exciting and accessible arts and cultural activities, projects and initiatives for, by and with local communities
- value adding arts and culture into existing non-arts projects or events that could support growing new audiences or markets
- leveraging RADF investment to entice other funding partners to support more strategic arts and culture initiatives in local communities (for example, increasing amenity, community pride and liveability of local areas through infrastructure, public art, place-making projects)
- regional pooling of RADF investment towards regional initiatives or programs to deliver cross regional arts and cultural-led outcomes
- professional, career and capacity development opportunities for local artists and arts workers
- engagement of key target groups such as young people or CALD communities or programs targeting particular geographic locations

Please note that applicants (except for those funded for career development projects) must capture audience/participant/partner feedback from their project (eg: survey, interviews, comment box, stakeholder debrief) and provide details in the Outcome Report.

How much can I apply for?

This fund offers up to \$5,000 per application.

When can I apply?

The Regional Arts Development Fund opens on the first Monday in September and closes the last Friday of October.

Decisions are advised approximately 10 weeks after the round closing date.

Applications will not be eligible if proposed activities occur before the 10 week announcement date. Retrospective funding requests will not be supported.

Eligibility criteria

All applicants must:

- be an individual, organisation or Collective/Artist Run initiative;
- have satisfied the reporting requirements of any previous Council funding;
- be an Australian citizen or permanent resident if applying as an individual;
- have an active Australian business number (ABN);
- be over 18 years of age or have their application co-signed by their legal guardian confirming they will take responsibility for managing any grant offered - if applying as an individual;
- Ensure the project or program activity commences after the date that Council advises outcome of the application for funding:
- Be based in the Douglas Shire or demonstrate how the project will directly benefit Douglas Shire arts and culture.

Applications will be deemed ineligible if:

- they are submitted after the closing date;
- they are faxed or emailed:
- they are incomplete or do not contain the compulsory support material;
- the activities to be funded occur before the 10 week announcement date;
- they ask for 100% of project or program costs;
- applicants have already been awarded funding in that same financial year;
- the application form is altered in any way.
- A specialist funding body exists for the project or program (e.g. Screen Queensland for filmmaking);
- Funding is to be utilised for planning for or maintenance of infrastructure; capital or equipment costs, fundraising activities, awards, competitions, elsteddfods or prizes.

Applicants can apply to the fund multiple times (if more than one round is offered) but can only be awarded funding once per financial year.



Application and Assessment Process

- Step 1: It is recommended that all applicants make contact with Council to determine the suitability of the application prior to submission.
- Step 2: You must submit the application by the closing date. The application will be checked by Council for
- Step 3: Your application will be assessed by the RADF Committee, the Committee will:
 - assess your application against the Fund criteria and moderate with consideration of: available funding; balance across art forms; geographic spread, target groups and government priorities.
 - recommend to the RADF Liaison Officer which applications should be funded and for what level of
- Step 4: Council will ratify the recommendations presented by the RADF Liaison Officer on behalf of the RADF Committee. Council can veto recommendations, but only when they are not in line with Council's Corporate Plan, locally identified priorities or interfere with council initiatives already in progress.

Assessment criteria

All applications are assessed by the RADF Committee against the following criteria. The indicators listed are a sample of the types of evidence that could demonstrate achievement of each criterion and will vary according to the type of applicant and nature of the project or program.

- 1. QUALITY: Artistic achievement, contribution to growing the arts sector and strengthening the community of arts in Queensland.
 - high standard of artistic or cultural achievement in your field, appropriate to the stage of your career for individual applicants
 - artistic and cultural significance of the program you will undertake for individual applicants
 - Evidence of a high standard of artistic and cultural product, processes and/or services.
 - Demonstrates artistic progression and cultural innovation.
 - Contributes to building the capacity of the local arts sector and legacy outcomes.
 - Engages personnel with the expertise and experience to deliver artistic or cultural objectives.
- REACH: The ability to respond to and attituate demand, providing access to, participation in and positive experiences of arts across Queensland. (not required for individual applicants)
 - Evidence of market demand and the ability to generate participation and/or audience numbers, or a broader public outcome.
 - Demonstrates progressive approaches to stimulate audience or industry participation/engagement.
 - Evidence of high quality marketing with demonstrated audience reach and effective promotional campaign.
 - Accessibility of the project or program to diverse audiences, participants and communities or to a specific target group.
- 3. IMPACT: Articulation of public value, contributing to the cultural profile of Queensland and delivering upon Queensland Government priorities.
 - professional standing of personnel you will work with for individual applicants
 - impact of the proposed activity on your career for individual applicants
 - Evidence of community and/or industry need and support for the project or program.
 - Demonstrates a good return on Investment through cultural, social or economic outcomes.
 - Raises the profile of Queensland arts and culture.
 - Contributes to the liveability and participation in community life for Queenslanders.





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4. VIABILITY: A viable, value for money proposal.

- effective use of resources and value for money Evidence of economic effectiveness and value for money for individual applicants
- Evidence of good planning and logistics including a sound process to evaluate outcomes.
- Evidence of financial and in-kind support from sources other than Arts Queensland.
- Evidence of the calibre of partnerships and collaborations including financial partners.

Recommendations may be moderated to ensure balance across areas such as geographic regions, art forms and targeted priorities.

Applicants may be requested to provide additional follow up information as part of the assessment process.

Your application must be postmarked by the closing date for the round. Late, incomplete, faxed or emailed applications will not be assessed. USB devices cannot be returned to applicants as they form part of the record of your application.

Notification of outcomes

All successful and unsuccessful applicants will be notified either by email or by mail approximately 10 weeks after the closing date.

What are the acquittal and reporting requirements for successful applicants?

Funding recipients will be required to submit an Outcome Report to Council within 20 business days of completing the project or program.

The outcome report collects information about outputs and outcomes from your project or program, including artistic, cultural, social and economic returns on investment.

It is recommended that you familiarise yourself with the outcome report before you submit your application, so you understand the obligations which come with government funding as well as the types of outcomes Arts Queensland is interested in evaluating from its investment.
