#### **DAINTREE FORUM #1 – STATUS REPORT**

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

### That Council receive and note the report.

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

This report provides details the issues raised by the local community at the first Daintree Forum held at Diwan on 28 August 2014, and Council's actions to date in response. **BACKGROUND:** 

On 3 June 2014 the following Notice of Motion was carried unanimously:

- 1. That the Council undertake no less than three (3) community Forums engaging with the communities north of the Daintree River within the term of the current Council;
- 2. The first Forum to be conducted early in the 2014/15 financial year and the second and third Forums to be conducted during the 2015 calendar year.
- 3. That the Forums either be general or specific in terms of the issues the Council may seek to canvass.

Councillors were in agreement that there are many unique issues affecting the communities living north of the Daintree River, and that there is an opportunity for the new Council to demonstrate that it has a serious intention to respond to and rectify any perception that the community has been somewhat ignored and underserviced by the former Douglas Shire and Cairns Regional Councils, and other service providers.

While not all issues are the responsibility of Council to resolve, Council considered that providing a Forum as an opportunity for the communities north of the River to have direct contact with Council would be beneficial, particularly if the new Douglas is to stay true to its objective of providing open, transparent and inclusive government.

A Forum attended by approximately 45 local residents and business operators was convened in Diwan on 28 August 2014 from 10.00am to 1.30pm with discussion generally under the following four sessions:

- 1. Communication and broad community matters
- 2. Growing the Daintree economy
- 3. Environment
- 4. Disaster management.

#### PROPOSAL:

The following summarises the issues and comments raised by the community and discussed at the Forum, the action taken by Council to date and the schedule for future work. A detailed issues register is attached.

# 1. Communication and broad community matters

A range of community issues was expressed, with the need for reliable communication, the provision of Council support and the creation of opportunities to develop sustainable business, and the provision of power by the State Government.

Council actions to date:

a) Daintree Gateway

Following the Forum, work on the first stage of the Daintree Gateway Project commenced, with the planting of entrance gardens, the sinking of a bore, preparation of a Brief for entrance and Ferry artwork by Kuku Yalanji artists and the invitation extended to local artists to make submissions, stakeholders' consultation and the development of interpretative signage, planning for and ordering new and accessible toilets, planning for the rationalisation of street signage and the installation of way-finding signage, planning for the refurbishment of the northern side Ferry noticeboard and bus stop. This first stage of the Daintree Gateway will be completed in early Februarv 2014. Watch the planting of one of the dardens here https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=qwxetu3uKiU

b) Power north of the Daintree River

On 18 November 2014 Council unanimously adopted a Mayoral Minute proposing Council advocate for the supply of power north of the River and a Notice of Motion on the same topic. A letter dated 20 November 2014 advising Council's policy position was sent to the Premier of Queensland, the Hon. Campbell Newman.

c) Business sustainability

A number of small business tools and support lines have been implemented onto the web site, <u>http://douglas.qld.gov.au/supporting-small-business/</u>. Through collaboration with other departments and organisations there is also extensive promotion of workshop and networking opportunities, including webinars, on Councils Facebook site.

The Douglas Card (formerly the Smart Card) has again been implemented including the promotional brochure where participating businesses offer discounts to visitors. The Douglas Card is available from 1 November to 28 February to encourage an increase in visitation. The Card has been promoted in the local papers of neighbouring local government areas and has been promoted widely by Tourism Port Douglas Daintree (TPPD) and the participating businesses.

### 2. Growing the economy

Specific concerns were raised by the community in this session: the creation of sustainable employment, helping people to help themselves, supporting participation, building capacity across different industries, the development of amenities for tourists, Ferry travel including options for ticketing, the development of Daintree branding and signage, opportunities to diversify business (including the development of a memorial garden) and the impact of illegal camping. The possible construction of a bridge across the Daintree River was discussed, together with some of the advantages and disadvantages, however on balance, the idea was rejected by those at the Forum.

Council action to date:

### a) Daintree Gateway

The first stage of the work on the Daintree Gateway is designed to make the visitor experience more interesting and informative, to increase visitation and encourage longer stays, and to offer a greater level of amenity for all, including residents. Council gratefully acknowledges the award of funding in July 2014 from the Department of Local Government to support this work.

In November 2014 an invitation was issued to Yalanji artists to make submissions for the entrance signage at the corner of the Mossman Daintree Road and Baileys Creek Road, and for new Ferry artwork to replace the photo of Palm Cove. This work is also being developed in conjunction with the Traditional Owners of the land. The conceptual designs are in the final stages of selection with the Elders and will then be presented to Councillors and broader community.

The interpretative Daintree Rainforest signage (to be installed in the "kiosk" near the public boat ramp) has been redeveloped with key stakeholders including Traditional Owners, Wet Tropics Management Authority and the Douglas Historical Society. The signage is in the final stages of development and will be ready for manufacture in the coming weeks. (Interpretative signage for Daintree Village will be developed in conjunction with Daintree Village residents and businesses as a separate project).

Directional (street) signage on Baileys Creek Road towards the Ferry is being reviewed and will be rationalised, with only what is required to be retained.

b) Daintree Tourism

Staff will contact the Daintree Co-Op to explore the opportunity of a community market at the newly redeveloped Gateway. At the Forum the community commented that local knowledge and good customer service encourages longer visitation. Council staff have started discussions with TPDD and the Daintree Marketing Coop to determine the support that can be offered. Staff are also investigating working with the local job service providers to offer a customer service course for those employed in relevant industries or who are interested in gaining employment in that sector. Staff will provide information funding information for specific training/activities to anyone in the community who requests the same. General funding information is available on Council's website.

Contact has been initiated with the Chair of the Daintree Marketing Coop regarding attendance at meetings and officers being able to attend to discuss opportunities for future promotion/branding etc. A preliminarily discussion has been held with TPDD regarding opportunities for promotions.

### c) Daintree Ferry

Questions were raised around the current eligibility of visitors to utilise the Ferry priority lane. Staff are investigating and collating information relating to the original decision of Council and plan to present a report to Council prior to the opening of the priority lane for the 2015 tourist season.

A number of queries were raised relating to ticketing options for travel on the Ferry including but not limited to purchasing online, purchase of fares from other outlets and whether people who book at businesses north of the River may obtain free travel. A comprehensive review of Ferry ticketing operations will be a project proposed to be included in the 2015/16 Operational Plan. To ensure the most beneficial result, staff plan to engage relevant industry professionals if funds are allocated in the 2015/16 Annual Budget.

# 3. Environment

In this session the community discussed the importance of weed control and identification, feral pig and dog control, and the impact of vegetation close to the main roads, endangering wildlife.

Council action to date:

a) Weed control and identification

Cow Bay has one of the largest infestations in the region with over 300 hectares infested. Council has been treating Pond Apple in the Daintree Lowlands for over 15 years. It is estimated that initial control of the core infestation at Cow Bay would cost >\$500K. Douglas conducted 498 man hours on Pond Apple control in 2014.

Council presented at the Daintree Biodiversity Forum hosted by Terrain in December 2014 at Cape Tribulation. The Forum had a major focus on pests and weeds, including high priority invasive species, sleeper weeds and weed identification. The attendance at the Forum from the local community was very low / poor.

b) Feral pig and dog control

For the past nine years and in conjunction with Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service, Douglas has funded the Daintree Community Feral Pig Trapping Program, removing over 4500 pigs since the program commenced. A recent community survey regarding Council's Feral Pig management was undertaken at the Daintree Biodiversity Forum held at Cape Tribulation in December 2014. The results showed overwhelming support for the program, insisting Douglas should continue to fund the program with a focus on increasing size and scope. The survey will now also be released to the wider community for input.

Dog issues, both wild and domestic should be reported to Council. Dog traps are available for use on request from Council.

Limiting dog access at the Ferry is not an option at this stage and would require changes to the Local Law and significant resourcing.

c) Roadside vegetation and re-vegetation at Cow Bay

Staff are to undergo further training on operating within the WTMA Road Maintenance Code of Practice. Road side herbicide works are essential to maintain safety site lines and drainage.

Revegetation works at Cow Bay were completed on site 2013. The area suffered minor loses due pedestrian traffic and the dry season. Council will infill gaps to address erosion issues in the 2015 wet season.

d) Boat Ramp at Cow Bay

There have been previous investigation into access onto the beach and this can be revisited; it is unclear what the issues are at this stage. It is however extremely unlikely that a boat ramp would be constructed.

# 4. Disaster Management

The Forum attendees complimented Council on its disaster event planning, its management of communications, access and recovery following Cyclone Ita. Frequent Facebook posts were particularly well regarded, as was the attention given to residents on the vulnerable persons list. The police presence north of the River was appreciated. The need for a cyclone shelter was raised along with the ongoing difficulties experienced with Telstra landlines in extreme weather events. The poor condition of the helipad was noted.

Council action to date:

a) Telstra communication

The provision of Telstra services to individual properties is a matter between Telstra and its customers. Council does however maintain regular contact with Telstra representatives and can advocate, in general, for improved services.

b) Cyclone shelter north of the River

Officers recommend that Council consider requiring/requesting that any new State Government facilities be built to a suitable standard to serve as a shelter.

c) Daintree walking track

Some investigation and discussion has occurred in relation to the CREB Track and China Camp areas.

d) Unique Post Code for Daintree/north of the River

Council has been advised that the community is pursuing this with Australia Post.



# COUNCIL'S ROLE:

Council can play a number of different roles in certain circumstances and it is important to be clear about which role is appropriate for a specific purpose or circumstance. The implementation of actions will be a collective effort and Council's involvement will vary from information only through to full responsibility for delivery.

The following areas outline where Council has a clear responsibility to act:



### FINANCIAL/RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

Daintree Forum #1 was conducted with minimal cost, in a Council owned facility. The actions taken to date have either been funded through Council's approved budget, or in the case of the Daintree Gateway work, funded with the assistance of a State Government grant. Suggestions, programs and initiatives that have not yet been investigated or implemented may need to be funded (if approved) in future budgets. To date, staff and existing resources have been used to respond to proposals.

# **RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS:**

While all actions carry some degree of risk, there are no substantial risks in any of the actions taken to date. Future projects and actions will be assessed from a risk perspective on a case by case basis.

# SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS:

ECONOMIC: The suggestions and comments made at the Forum by residents and business operators highlighted the importance of economic sustainability in this remote area of the Shire, and the value of Council support. Some of the initiatives supporting economic development and increased visitation were in train prior to the forum (eg Douglas Card, Daintree Gateway works) while others (eg Daintree River market, business signage and Daintree branding) are yet to be investigated in detail.

ENVIRONMENTAL: A passion for the rainforest environment was the most common reason cited by residents for living north of the River. Some of the many physical and logistical challenges were acknowledged and discussed. This Forum provided a valuable opportunity for Councillors and officers to hear more of the priority environmental issues.

SOCIAL: The Forum provides support for social cohesion, bringing community members together to share ideas and solve problems.

### **INTERNAL/EXTERNAL CONSULTATION:**

The Forum provided the opportunity for the Daintree community north of the River to be consulted on a wide range of issues.
